Attachment: AWEF Program Overview

Five Year AWEP Funded – Southeast Lake Michigan

- **AWEP – Agricultural Water Enhancement Program**
 - Not a grant, but a program funded by USDA
 - Covers St. Joseph River, Kalamazoo River and Black River Watersheds
 - \$27 million over 5 years, with 79% of the funds going to Michigan and 21% of the funds going to Indiana. Based on percentage of land in farms within the target watersheds in each state.
 - 190,000 acres in the southeast Lake Michigan watershed
 - Farmers must apply through their local NRCS offices.
 - Funds will be used to offset the cost of adopting practices that protect water quality and quantity.
- **2009 Allocation**
 - \$2 million requested for allocation in 2009 with \$1.5 million to Michigan and \$500,000 to Indiana.
 - FY 2009 funds must be allocated no later than September 4.
 - EQIP rules will apply for each state for FY2009
 - 2009 will target EQIP non-funded applications with eligible practices that reside within the target watersheds.
- **Steering Committee**
 - Made up of individuals in all three watersheds, including conservation district, watershed councils, NRCS representatives, and other interested individuals
- **Proposal submitted & supported by:**
 - Michigan Association of Conservation Districts (MACD)
 - Kalamazoo River Water Council (KRCW)
 - Friends of the St. Joe River (FotSJR)
 - Conservations Districts in Indiana and Michigan
 - Michigan and Indiana Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS)
 - Indiana Association of Soil & Water Conservation Districts (IASWCD)
 - Plus many other organizations too numerous to mention provided letters of support to the proposal
- **Eligible cost share practices include:**
 - Irrigation Water Management
 - Cover Crops
 - Filter Strips
 - Diversions & Fencing
 - Nutrient Management
 - Pest Management
 - Pasture and Hay Planting
 - Watering Facility, water well for livestock watering
 - Water & Sediment Control Basin
 - Waste Storage Facility for livestock
 - Plus others
